

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THE EUCHARIST - Gathering

The Eucharist: Communion with Christ and with one another. The gospel that will underpin this theme is: the Disciples on the Road to Emmaus (Lk.24:13-35).

The parts of the Mass give rise to three 'Communions':

- communion with Christ in our neighbour
- communion with Christ in the Word and
- communion with Christ in the sacramental signs of bread and wine.

The first part of the Mass, goes up to the Opening Prayer or 'Collect'. This deals with the first of the three 'Communions' mentioned above—communion with Christ in our neighbour.

Stage One - Gathering

In this first stage, the Introductory Rite of the Mass Christ gathers us as a Eucharistic Community http://www.iec2012.ie/ index.jsp?p=157&n=164&a=0

Every community that assembles for Mass, no matter how small, represents the Universal Church in this great action of the Eucharist. As such, Mass is a public act and not a private or individual activity. I mentioned the road to Emmaus gospel as a underpin. The following is the relevant extract to gathering:

'Now on that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus... While they were talking and discussing, Jesus himself came near and went with them... As they came near the village to which they were going, he walked ahead as if he were going on. But they urged him strongly, saying, 'Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over.' So he went in to stay with them.' (Lk 24:13-17, 29)

What this extract demonstrates is that The Risen Crucified Christ gathers us together The disciples on the road to Emmaus ask Jesus to stay with them. In doing so he becomes the head of the family, as it were, gathering them together for the Eucharistic banquet. As each Mass is about to begin, people assemble together in one place drawn by Jesus Christ himself. It is good to re-discover this most obvious characteristic of the Mass - it assembles people of different ages, backgrounds and interests together. The components of the Introductory Rites at the Sunday celebration of Eucharist, which serve to gather and reinforce the Assembly's sense of identity, include the following: • The action of leaving home and arriving • Coming into the worship space (ie. church building)

- Finding seating Entrance Procession Gesture of Standing • Gathering Song
- Incensing the sacred elements including God's people • The Sign of the Cross • Rite of Sprinkling/The Penitential Rite
- The Gloria The Introductory Prayer The Assembly's response in AMEN
- · Gesture of Sitting.


PATHWAYS: EXPLORING FAITH AS AN ADULT
