### The Advocate

We have almost finished celebrating the Sacrament of Confirmation in our Parish. On Pentecost Sunday there 5 will young people from Pelletstown Educate together who will receive the Sacrament during the 10.30am Mass. I want to sincerely thank the Parish Team and the Confirmation Team. There is always a sense of satisfaction when a task is completed. The ceremonies themselves were lovely and more to the point, prayerful, and I have no doubt that all who attended were helped to pray for the hour that they were in the church on that day.

The big question for all of us is course 'what effect will that day have on the rest of the children's lives? What effect will the Holy Spirit have on the lives of their parents and older siblings who have already received the Holy Spirit? What effect if any, does the Holy Spirit have on us? The late Archbishop Joseph Cassidy RIP (Tuam Archdiocese - died 31/01/2013) had the following to say on the matter of the Holy Spirit who appears in our Gospel today when Jesus says that he will send the 'Advocate'.

"After his Resurrection, when he was going up to heaven (and we'll be celebrating that Ascension next week), Jesus' disciples were imploring him to stay with them. Their dismay at the prospect of his departure was very understandable. They were a small vulnerable group of people, on whom Our Lord had placed the enormous responsibility for evangelising the world. They need him. They needed his presence and support. In response to their distress and in recognition of their need, he made an extraordinary statement to them—one of the most astonishing statements in the whole of salvation history! 'It is for your own good that I am going' (Jn 16:7), he said. Imagine that! 'It is for your own good that I am going, because, unless I go, the Paraclete/Advocate will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you' (Jn 16:7). And he makes a similar promise in John's Gospel (Jn 14:25-26). 'I have said these things while still with you; but the Paraclete/Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all I have said to you.' So what sort of job does the Holy Spirit do? What's he there for? Or should I say what's he here for? The first thing to remember is that he Holy Spirit is God, but that he's God in his role as *enlightener* and *consoler*.

Don't think of him as a vague, vapour, insubstantial reality — a genie out of a bottle. Think of him as *guide* and *comforter* — the bright side of God, the warm side of God, the spirit of life, the spirit of love. There isn't one of us in the Church who doesn't have decisions to make in life — difficult decisions sometimes. God is there in his spirit to guide us. And we need his help. Let's not make difficult decisions on our own. All decisions are wiser if they are made in partnership with God. And there isn't one us here in this Church who doesn't need *consoling* at times. It may be depression, or sickness or conflict in the home, or worry about exams, or the job, or finding a house/home. We need the Holy Spirit to console us in situations like that, to help us through, to heal us and bring us peace of mind. 'Peace I bequeath to you, my own peace I give you, a peace which the world cannot give, this is my gift to you' (Jn 14:27).

I'd be very happy if, you began to think of the Holy Spirit as a very *dear friend* to whom you turn for *guidance* and *comfort*. And may you be guided and comforted and enriched by that friendship for the rest of your life!"

#### The Sacrament of the Sick

This sacrament proclaims God's immediate and saving presence, that God will act in a saving way within this very sickness, that God will make this illness redemptive; he will turn it 'unto good' on some way or another. Your illness may heal other wounds-in the family perhaps, or draw out the generosity of relations or the goodness of neighbours. God will comfort the sick person, strengthen you and reach through the pain to enlighten the mind or change the heart. That's what we mean when we say that God will use the illness 'redemptively'.
