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#### THE HOPE OF ETERNAL LIFE

We are likely to see eternal life promised by Jesus as something in the future, as something which occurs after death. Jesus in St. John's Gospel says "I will raise him on the last day" (Jn.6:44) and "whoever eats this bread will live for ever" (Jn.6:51). We're less accustomed to the idea that what Jesus promises is already ours. "Amen, amen, I say to You, whoever believes has eternal life" (Jn.6:47). These quotes from St. John's Gospel were part of the daily Mass readings of the third week of Easter

By faith and our relation to the Lord, we have already begun the life which has no end. He life is us by virtue of our baptism is the same life which will come to its full realisation only in the world to come. We live in Christ or Christ lives in us; we have become sons and daughters of God. This is the Easter message, this is the Church's underlying message is hope. Now hope is one of the three theological virtues of the Church along with Faith and Charity. (1.Cor.13:13). The Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) talks about hope in a number of places but mainly paragraphs 1817 fwd. Hope is a supernatural gift of God, by which we firmly trust that God will give us eternal life and all means necessary to obtain it, if we do what he requires of us. (1. Cor.2:9). St. Paul goes on to say in Romans that God will give us 'a hope which will not let us down'. (Rom.5:5). So hope is a feeling or desire for something and confidence in the possibility of its fulfilment. Important and all as definitions are, the best way of explaining Christian hope is by way of a story and Fr. Jack McArdle has a lovely story on this:

There were twins (a boy and a girl) in their mother's womb. After some time, they became aware of each other, and of the cord that bound them with their mother. They remarked that their mother must really love them to share her own life with them. After some more time, they became aware of little nails, and some hair appearing on their heads, and they wondered what this could mean. One of them said that they were getting ready to be born. This sent a shiver of terror down the spine of the other, who exclaimed 'I don't want to be born. I want to say where I am.' 'But you have to be born. We cannot remain her forever.' 'I don't want to be born', repeated the other. 'How do you know there's any life after this? Have you ever seen anyone who was born. Has anyone ever come back to tell us?' 'Well I don't know, but there has to be life after this. It would make no sense at all if this is the end, before we've had a proper beginning. There just has got to be a life after this.' 'How do you know there's a mother?' the other asked. 'What does she look like? Have you ever seen her? I bet we have just invented her to take care of our own insecurity.' And so, the argument went back and forth. One was already a little atheist, while the other was a person of faith, which means simply that he/ she had proof for nothing! Anyhow, the time arrived, and they were born. Shortly after birth, when it was safe to do so, they opened their eyes, and found themselves looking into the eyes of their mother. It filled their hearts with profoundest joy, and indescribable delight. They looked across at each other, as if to say 'Weren't we really stupid! How could we possibly have imagined anything like this?'

When we die we leave the 'womb of life' and enter into everlasting life which is a life that is more glorious than we have ever experienced or imagined (like the birth of the twins in the story). This is our faith and 'Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen'. (Heb.11:1)




# **Children's Corner**
