Saints in the Church's Calendar Friday 22nd July—St. Mary Magdalene

Stood by the Cross of Jesus; with two other women she discovered the empty tomb: she was granted an appearance of the Risen Lord early the same day, from which incident she has been described as 'the apostle to the apostles'. The Gospels give no warrant for identifying her with the 'woman who was a sinner' who anointed Christ's feet (Lk.7:37) or Mary, sister of Martha, who anointed him (Jn.12:3). Tradition relates that she spent her last years as a hermit in Provence (France). Saturday 23rd July—St. Bridget of Sweden, religious, Patron of Europe, born in Sweden in 1303. She brought up eight children, and after the death of her husband dedicated herself to an ascetical life. Later she founded the Bridgettine Order and lived in Rome. She wrote many works about her mystical experiences. She died in Rome in 1373. She was declared a patron of Europe in 2000.

THE EUCHARIST—Gathering

Following on from last week's newsletter, I wish go into a little detail on the first part of the Mass, also known as the 'Introductory Rite'

Introductory Rite

Opening Procession

The action of processing signals the beginning of the celebration. The procession - large or small - calls to mind for us the journey dimension of our lives. All of us are on a holy journey together. The people of Israel journeyed in the desert 'on eagle's wings' under the guidance of Moses, Joshua and others, towards the promised land (Ex 19:4). God provided them with manna as food for their journey. Jesus himself gathered disciples around them and together they journeyed up to Jerusalem. As we see in the case of the two disciples on the road to Emmaus, after his death and resurrection. the Risen Crucified Christ re-assembled his Messianic community who had been so shattered by the apparent total failure of his mission. He transformed his disciples to become followers of what they soon called 'the Way' (Jesus Christ, himself, being the Way, the Truth and the Life [Jn 14:6]). At every Mass Jesus Christ assembles this people to celebrate the great memorial of his passion, death and resurrection.

Greeting: In the name of the Father... When the priest reaches the altar he bows and kisses it. The altar is kissed as a sign of veneration because it is a symbol that Christ will make himself present upon it. The priest and the people then make the sign of the cross. The sign of the Cross commends the whole action of the Mass to the two central mysteries of the faith: the cross of Christ and the Holy Trinity. In the very opening greeting when the bishop or priest, acting in the person of Christ says, 'The Lord be with you', and the people respond, 'And also with you' (or 'with your spirit' as the new translation puts it), we are recognising the reality that Jesus Christ is present among us fulfilling and exceeding our every desire to gather together. He has promised: 'where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them' (Mt 18:20). But when we say that Jesus is among us, we also are recalling that he wants us to be where he is - in the very heart of God.

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THE EUCHARIST—Gathering (contd.)

Penitential Rite: I confess... Preparation for the Liturgy of the Word continues with the Penitential Rite. This rite helps us think of the many ways we have offended God and the great need we have for his mercy. It reminds us that we are all part of the mystical body of Christ and our actions affect all the members. This rite is particularly important today with so many fallen away from the sense of sin. The rite of penance most commonly used is the Confiteor, which means, "I confess" in Latin. This takes the form of a public declaration of our sins where we proclaim before God and everyone in the church that we have sinned through our own fault.

Next follows a plea for God's mercy, the Kyrie Eleison, which is Greek for "Lord, have mercy." Again, the purpose of this prayer is to

acknowledge our sinfulness and our need for God's mercy. Like all the prayers in the Mass, The Kyrie is profoundly scriptural. As we read the Gospels, we find many sinners crying out to Jesus asking for his mercy, recognising that he is the one who takes away our sins (CF. Mt 9:27-30; and Mk 10:46-52).

Gloria: Glory to God ... This is an ancient hymn of thanks, praise and triumph for our redemption. This song used the words the angels sang 18-22? LOOKING FOR A GAP YEAR? on the first Christmas morning. The Gloria is sung or said at every Sunday liturgy except during the seasons of Advent or Lent. It is omitted during Advent and Lent because we are "awaiting" the coming of the Saviour. During Lent it is omitted because of the deeply penitential nature of the season.

Opening Prayer: Let us pray... This prayer is also called the Collect. It is very well named because it takes all the pravers we have already offered to God, collects them as one and presents them to him. The Collect consists of four parts: calling upon God, recalling some deed he has done, making a request of him and offering the prayer to him through the mediation of Jesus, his Son. The congregation gives its assent to the prayer by responding "Amen." (IEC2012Theological and Pastoral Preparation Document)

Summer Dues envelopes are still available if you would like to make a contribution. Monies from these envelopes go to the Diocesan Common Fund (income for priests & retired priests).


Funeral Ministry
