The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

St. Thomas Aquinas speaks of the bread of angels sent for pilgrims in their banishment. The Eucharist is food for our journey. In the readings today a direct connection is made with the original miraculous bread showered on the people of Israel during their pilgrimage of redemption from slavery in Egypt. The manna that rained down from heaven was quite specific in where it fell. It was not scattered indiscriminately over the desert, but was gathered from around the tents and in the confines of the camp. The manna separated the people from what surrounded them. It marked them out as having a special identity and the privilege of a special mission. It made them into one people. It forged them into one body to be an instrument of God's glory.

The Eucharist is at the heart of the Church. It is the beating heart of the Church. The cardiac cycle is composed of systole and diastole, contraction or concentration and expansion. The Eucharist is dynamic. It draws us together but in order to send us out. The manna ceased to fall when the people crossed the Jordan. It was an anticipation of that life they would enjoy with God in the land. It was food for the journey. The Eucharist is food for our pilgrim journey, which is a procession to the kingdom.

Saints in the Church's Calendar

There are some lovely feasts this coming week:

Monday 20th—The Irish Martyrs in 1992 Saint John Paul II beatified 17 representative martyrs who suffered in Ireland during the 16th and 17th centuries. They include bishops, priests and lay men and women and Blessed Francis Taylor who was born in Swords, Co Dublin, circa 1550. He was elected Dublin's mayor in 1595. Later he was imprisoned for his Catholic faith, and died on 29 January 1621, after seven years of refusing to accept his freedom by giving up his religion. A statue of Blessed Francis Taylor and his grandmother-in-law, Blessed Margaret Ball, who had also died in prison (in 1584), stands outside St. Mary's Pro-Cathedral in Dublin.

Wednesday 22nd—St. Thomas Moore

1478-1535, the first commoner to be Lord Chancellor of England, also suffered martyrdom under Henry VIII. Patron of Lawyers and those in public life. St. John Paul II declared him patron of politicians in 2000

Thursday 24th—Nativity of John the Baptist we rejoice at the coming of St. John the Baptist, a man of self-denial, integrity of life and purpose, and an uncompromising prophetic voice. John means 'The Lord has shown favour.' This feast relates to the summer solstice, when the days begin to grow shorter, recalling John's words, 'He must increase, but I must decrease'. He was the last and the greatest of the prophets and he prepared for the coming of Christ.

Friday 24th—The Most Sacred Heart of

Jesus – understood in the light of the Scriptures, the term 'Sacred Heart of Jesus' denotes the entire mystery of Christ: Son of God, uncreated wisdom; infinite charity, principle of the salvation and sanctification of mankind.
