FROM THE PASTORS DESK

Liturgy of the Eucharist - The **Bread of Life**

The parts of the Mass give rise to three 'Communions' :

communion with Christ in our neighbour, communion with Christ in the Word and communion with Christ in the sacramental signs of bread and wine.

In the previous newsletters I have dealt with the first two. Now we come to the third 'Communion' - communion with Christ in the sacramental signs of bread and wine, sometimes referred to in the Scriptures as the "Breaking of Bread".

Before going into detail on the section of the Mass referred to as the 'Liturgy of the Eucharist', I will give an overview of the Eucharist or rather I will use part of a homily given by the Archbishop Diarmuid Martin on the Feast of Corpus Christi.

It is the Eucharist which builds up the Church making us the Body of Christ and therefore a people consecrated to God. The Church becomes the People of God through becoming the Body of Christ.

It is Jesus who shapes his Church. In the Eucharist, Jesus pours out his life for us. We are called to nourish ourselves with the bread of life and to drink the chalice of the new covenant. And we are called to witness to that covenant in our lives, through selfgiving love and in the joyful hope that the Lord will come again to fulfil his reign of love.

From the beginnings of the Church the disciples gathered; they came together to listen to the word of God and for the prayers and for the breaking of bread. (Acts.2:42) The Preparation Document) Eucharist was the central and distinctive event of their lives as Christians. It was out of this coming together for the breaking of bread, however, that the disciples developed a particular life-style, a Eucharistic life-style, where having shared in the one Eucharistic bread they then shared all things among themselves and with those in need.

The Eucharist is not just a personal possession. It shapes a new form of living. I can never be a Christian just on my own uncaring and un-thoughtful about those around me or what is going on around me. A Eucharistic life-style is always one which reaches out to others, especially to those who may be in

need or who are troubled. "Communion with Christ and with one another".

Our world is a world of contradictions. Social media and new technological means of coming closer to each other abound and yet there is still much loneliness. Our interdependence as peoples and nations and economies is so evident, - and yet we still think that self-centeredness and political isolationism can protect us. The fragility of human solidarity is so evident as new conflicts and ideologies arise - and yet we find it difficult to embrace tolerance and respect for others. Our young people long for peace and the ability to realise their talents - and yet violence and exclusion still abound.

A Eucharistic life-style is one where the notions of caring and sharing dominate, where self-giving love is the mark of how we live, and how we base our choices and how we interact with others.

The Church will be renewed only when believers in Jesus Christ truly come together regularly to listen to the word of God and to share in the bread of life and when from that nourishment they develop a new way of living and witnessing to their faith, in the Church and in society.

At the beginnings of the Church, as the Acts of the Apostles remind us: "Day by day, the Lord added to their number". (Acts.2:47) Today, the Lord will renew the Church and add to our number as believers in the measure in which we live that lifestyle which only our sharing in the body and blood of Christ can enable and foster.

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Saints in the Church's Calendar

Monday 22nd - The Queenship of Mary During the middle ages, Mary was venerated as queen of the angels and saints. Pope Pius XII prescribed the memorial for the universal Church at the close of the Marian Year 1955. It is placed on this date to stress the connection of Mary's queenship and with the Assumption Wednesday 24th—St. Bartholomew, Apostleoriginally from Cana in Galilee and is usually identified with Nathanael, who was introduced to the Lord by St. Philip. According to Tradition, after Pentecost he preached the Gospel in Arabia, India and Armenia, where he was flaved alive. He is this patron of tanners, plasterers and leather-workers

Saturday 27th—St. Monica c332-87,

converted her pagan husband, Patricius to the faith, and by her prayers and tears brought her son St. Augustine to Christianity and a moral life. Patron saint of mothers.

Upgrade of the Church Extension

The extension is a wonderful space with the possibility of being so much more. With refurbishment it can become an ideal space for holding liturgical services, sacramental preparation, faith formation etc., part of our 'Building Hope' program in the parish.

It has recently been repainted (first time in over 40 years) and had the lighting upgraded There has long been a desire to replace the pews, which are in a state of disrepair, with more suitable seating. The cost of replacing the pews with 200 chairs and providing some suitable tables for the main body of the church will be somewhere in the region of €45,000. We are also in the process of getting quotes for recarpeting the extension and the altar. We expect work to proceed in the autumn.
