Sacraments of Confirmation and 1st Eucharist

Confirmation Ceremonies—The celebration of the Sacrament of Confirmation for our Parish Schools continues this coming week. I wish the schools well in all their preparation this coming week, and I hope the weather is fantastic on the day.

Sale of 128 Broadway Road—The Parish Finance and Property Committee have approved the sale of the Presbytery on 128 Broadway Rd (*the home of the late much beloved Fr John Casey RIP*). In recent weeks the Finance and Property Committee obtained an Architect's report on the Parochial House situated on the Church grounds. The house is in abysmal condition needing significant funding to bring it back to habitable condition.

 We make this our prayer through Christ Our Lord. Amen.

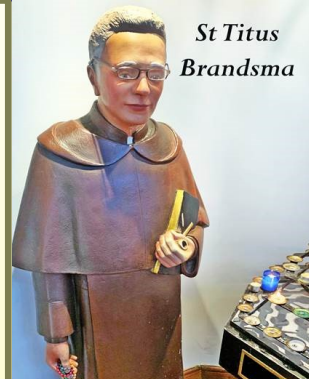

Parish Gathering – Building Hope

You are invited to discuss the Diocesan Project 'Building Hope' in the **Church (extension) at 7.30pm on Tuesday 31st May**. The format of the evening will be similar to when we gathered for the Synod. Please do come along. Our Church in Dublin is changing before our very eyes!



'The Church is continually changing and adapting. The People of God are a people on the move, a people on pilgrimage through life and history. This is how the Church actually is; never static, but continually responding to a changing cultural context.'

You might well ask 'What is going on with the church at present? Why so many meetings?' The quick answer is because the church is not a building, or an institution, but is the people of God, the faithful. In the recent past, three separate initiatives have been launched; each, in their own way, trying to renew and reinvigorate the church so each have reached out to the people of God.

1. In Oct 2019 the Parish Pastoral Council held a Parish Assembly to determine the priorities for our parish. These were reported back in Feb 2020 just before Covid struck which effectively delayed matters for nearly 2 years.
2. Archbishop Farrell, appointed to Dublin in early 2021, began a diocesan level consultation process called Building Hope. Phase 1 ended in Oct 2021 with the publication of the Building Hope Task Force Report. This Report, itself based on over 3000 contributions, called for the consultation process to continue, and go deeper.
3. Meanwhile, Pope Francis had announced the 2023 Synod on Synodality and requested that all parishes worldwide should hold Synodal Gatherings in early 2022. Archbishop Farrell immediately postponed his initiative to allow parishes to participate as fully as possible in the Synod. Now that the Synod is completed at parish level, the Building Hope initiative is starting again.

Clearly there is a lot of overlap between these 3 initiatives. But there are also key differences. The Parish Assembly was focused purely on St Brigid's and what we can do locally, in our parish. The Synod focuses on the universal church and provided a sort of SWOT analysis (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats) at a global level. Building Hope is somewhere in between. It is discussing our parish, but in the context of the parishes around us in Dublin 15 and the challenge of declining resources facing the whole diocese.

Each initiative has its own distinct flavour and approach. As everyone knows, if you are facing a difficult situation, approaching it from different angles allows you to see it in the round and get a much better understanding of what needs to be done. These processes complement each other. And, if we are to be a Synodal church, then consultation and discernment will be an ongoing feature of life in the church. In short, if you want to have your voice heard then please turn up and speak up!

We are holding one meeting **on Tues. 31st May at 7:30 pm in the Church Extension** to review the current situation in the parish, what is working well and what needs to be developed. And we will begin to reflect on how we can best manage and share our gifts, talents, and resources, not only within our own parish, but also in other parishes in the area with whom it might make sense for us to partner in the future. **Do please come along to the meeting.**
