FROM THE PASTORS DESK **Covid and Holidays**

Unfortunately, I have a long standing booking for holidays next week; but hopefully it will aid my full recovery from covid. THE EUCHARIST – Liturgy of the Word Ignorance of scripture is ignorance of Christ

with one another. The gospel that will underpin this theme is: the Disciples on the Road to Emmaus (Lk.24:13-35).

The parts of the Mass give rise to three 'Communions' -

- * communion with Christ in our neighbour,
- * communion with Christ in the Word and
- * communion with Christ in the sacramental signs of bread and wine.

Stage Two – Liturgy of the Word Christ gathers us to listen, to hear, to be nourished and to be formed into community by God's Word which places the emphasis on the how the Liturgy of the Word nourishes our Communion;

The Word of God

Sacred scripture is the inspired Word of God for the salvation of all humankind. In the Catechism of the Catholic Church (No.104) we read, "In Sacred Scripture, the Church constantly finds her nourishment and her strength, for she welcomes it not as a human word, "but as what it really is, the word of God" (1.Thess.2:13).

In the Emmaus story we hear the Risen Christ rebuke the two disciples for not sufficiently allowing Scripture to nourish their faith 'Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared!' (Lk 24:25). Before opening their eyes to recognise him in the breaking of bread, Jesus opens the Scriptures for the disciples and interprets them. What the Lord is in effect saying to the two disciples is that getting to know him through the scriptures, is intimately linked to their personal encounter with him in faith in the breaking of the bread. The sixth chapter of the Gospel according to John also indicates that receiving the Bread of Life cannot be detached from listening to, believing in, and living out the word of Jesus Christ.

St. John Damascene - 8th **Century**, has the following reflection on the Word of God.

The Word of God is a scented garden.

The Bible is a scented garden, delightful, beautiful. It enchants our ears with birdsong in a sweet, divine and spiritual (contd)

harmony; it touches our heart, comforts us in sorrow, soothes us in a moment of anger, and fills us with eternal joy. Let us knock at its gate with diligence and with perseverance.

Let us not be discouraged from knocking. The latch will be opened. If we have read a page of the bible two or three times and not understood it, let us not be tired of re-reading it and meditating on it.

Let us seek in the fountain of this garden 'a spring of water welling up to eternal life' (Jn.4:14). We shall taste a joy that will never dry up, because the grace of the bible garden is inexhaustible. (Source:IEC2012Theological and Pastoral Preparation Document)

Our thanks go to all who have been involved our Liturgy of the Word this week-our leaders, readers and sacristans. It was good to reflect on God's Word together and to support one another in prayer. We will continue to grow into this way of praying together as we learn to listen to the Word of God with open hearts and minds.

Saints in the Church's Calendar

Mon. 25th—St. James, Apostle son of Zebedee and brother of John, called the Greater. He was one of the three apostles, along with St. Peter and St. John, who witnessed the Transfiguration (Mt.17:1) and the agony in the Garden (Mt.16:37). He was put to death by Herod Agrippa about the year 44, being the first of the apostles to die for Christ. His shrine is at Compostella in Spain.

Tues. 26th—Ss. Joachim and Anne parents of the Blessed Virgin Mary & grandparents of the Lord. An old tradition going back to the second century gives these names. They remind us that the Word truly became flesh in a particular family. Our devotion to them is an extension of our love of Mary and her Divine Son. St. Anne is patron of Canada, women in labour, miners, cabinet-makers and home-makers.

Friday 29th—St. Martha Sister of Lazarus and Mary, is a woman of faith who made her profession of faith in Christ as the Son of God, and in the resurrection. In welcoming a guest, we welcome Christ: we show our Christian spirit of service; and we ready ourselves to be welcomed as guests in the Kingdom of God. Patron of innkeepers. cooks and dieticians.


