### Saints in the Church's Calendar

Wednesday 29th June—Ss. Peter and Paul, On the day traditionally considered by pagan Rome to be its foundation day by Romulus, we celebrate the twin founders of the Church in Rome. St. Peter died by crucifixion and St. Paul by beheading between 64-67

Peter was a humble fisherman, chosen as the leader of the Twelve, the 'rock' on which the Church was built. Paul, a tentmaker from Tarsus, a Pharisee and a Roman citizen, a persecutor of the first Christians, was converted by the Lord on his way to Damascus. He became the Apostle of the Gentiles. But they were chosen to become the pillars of our faith, which they sealed with their martyrdom in Rome.

The Church is like the human person: we are both body and spirit at the one time. The body of Christ - which is what we are - has both a bodily reality (membership, structure and sacraments) and a spiritual reality (the life of faith and prayer, the indwelling Spirit). The institutional and the prophetic dimensions of Church are sometimes in tension and that is really normal. To be part of the living body of Christ is to hear again Jesus' question, who do you say I am? As St. Paul reminds us, no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit (1 Cor 12:3). Christ, Son of the living God, you call us to confess your name and to acknowledge you as Lord. Help us to live our faith and find new words for what we believe so that we may proclaim your Gospel to our contemporaries in words they can understand.

Friday 1<sup>st</sup> July—St. Oliver Plunkett was ordained in Rome in 1654 and became professor of theology from 1654 to 1669, when he was appointed Archbishop of Armagh. He was arrested and tried in Dundalk in 1679 for conspiring against the state. So as not to be convicted in Ireland he was moved to Newgate prison where he was found guilty of high treason 'for promoting the Catholic faith'. He was martyred at Tyburn by being hung, drawn and quartered. He was the last catholic to die for his faith at Tyburn, and the first of the Irish martyrs to be beatified. His head is in St. Peter's Drogheda and most of his body is at Downside Abbey, England.

### THE EUCHARIST

**Ten Years ago** the 50<sup>th</sup> International Eucharistic Congress (IEC2012) was held in Dublin - June 10<sup>th</sup> to 17<sup>th</sup> 2012. I'm sure many of you have fond memories of the occasion. Over the summer weeks and months I thought that the main article in the newsletter should be on the Eucharist. The basis for the next two weeks newsletters is a homily given by Archbishop Diarmuid Martin in February 2012 in the run up to the Congress. It is a lovely discussion on the Eucharist

"The celebration of the Eucharist begins with the nourishment of the word. Week by week the word of God is proclaimed, and broken and indeed prayed. Our psalmody, which is an essential part of the liturgy, reflects the prayer of God's people along the history of salvation. It is a prayer uniquely related with the fundamental anxieties, hopes and aspirations of God's people, as they recalled how God had remained faithful to them over generations. The communal proclamation and prayerful interiorization of the scriptures incorporates us in a special way into the reality of that history of God's people and helps put into focus what our real hopes should be.

You do not simply go to Mass. The liturgy is not a performance but an action in which God's people actively participate. The liturgy is however in the first place the action of God. Active participation is not just about us saying and doing things. There is an active participation which is fostered through silence and reflection and interiorly identifying ourselves with what is taking place. In today's world there is anyway a superabundance of words and a fear of silence. The liturgy must always lead people beyond the superficial and fleeting character of much of contemporary culture.

Where the liturgy becomes performance we can very easily end up with banalities and with what some have called the "disneyisation" of the liturgy. The liturgy is not our work.

Our society today has its many hungers. Eucharist is nourishment on the path of our journey which helps us to encounter something that cannot be encountered in any other way. It is in the Eucharist that we encounter Jesus Christ, who reveals to us who God is. In the Eucharist we encounter Jesus who paradoxically in becoming one of us revealed the total otherness of God from us. Our encounter in the liturgy with transcendence, with that total otherness of God, radically transforms our hungers and our sense of community".


