

Liturgy of the Eucharist - Gifts of **Bread and Wine**

In last week's newsletter I spoke in general on the "Eucharist". The next few newsletter's will focus exclusively on the 'Liturgy of the Eucharist' as we have it in the Mass. "When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them". (Lk.24:30)-from the gospel of "The Road to Emmaus". The Liturgy of the Eucharist corresponds to the words and actions of Christ at the Last Supper that have been handed down to us in Scripture and Tradition. There are four accounts of the institution of the Eucharist in Scripture (Mt.26:17-35; Mk.14:12-21; Lk.22:7-38 and 1.Cor11:23-26).

The Liturgy of the Eucharist consists of the preparation of the gifts, thanksgiving and communion.

The Preparation of the Gifts

Here the bread and wine with water are brought to the altar, the same elements that Christ took in his hands. These gifts will become Christ's body and blood. They are simple elements and signs of God's love.

There may be a procession for the presentation of the gifts and these (the bread and wine) are brought to the altar by members of the congregation, thus, the faithful offer the elements Christ took in his hands at the Last Supper. If at all possible they should not come from the front of the Church as the element of procession is lost The bread and wine are the tokens of our sacrifice, which the priest offers on our behalf.

The priest places the bread and wine on the altar. The wine is poured into a chalice along with a drop of water. The wine represents the divinity of Christ and the water his humanity. The priest then asks God the Father to send his spirit to sanctify these gifts with prayers that are taken from ancient prayers, many of which are still said in the homes of Jews during the celebration of the Sabbath. He then prays a prayer of contrition and a second prayer that accompanies the "washing of hands." This second prayer is "Lord, wash away my iniquity and cleanse me from my sins." This prayer is taken from Psalm 51:2 and the accompanying ritual of hand washing comes from the Jewish law of cleansing that preceded a sacrificial offering. Following the washing of hands the priest invites us to pray with him that God may accept our sacrifice "for the praise and glory of his name, for our good, and the good of all his *Church."* The priest then prays one last prayer over the gifts of bread and wine before the Eucharistic prayer begins.

To summarise, in preparing the gifts, we are not only opening ourselves to the action of God who will change the bread and wine into the body and blood of Christ, we are making ourselves available to be transformed into instruments of communion. The addition of a drop of water to the chalice can be understood in this sense too as signifying our humanity that is to be united to Jesus Christ's self-offering that we commemorate at the Eucharist and in whom we are made one. Saints in the Church's Calendar

Monday 29th - The Passion of St. John the Baptist The gospels relate how St. John fearlessly condemned Herod Antipas's unlawful marriage to Herodias, who had been previously married to his half-brother. The outraged Herodias had him imprisoned. In a moment of weakness Herod promised to grant the heart's desire of Salome, the daughter of Herodias. She asked for John the Baptist's head, which was promptly fetched for her. Thus the Precursor of the Lord preceded his master through his passion.

Saturday 3rd Sept.—St. Gregory the Great—540-604. Roman noble who was Prefect of the City before becoming a monk. As Pope he established a pattern for the papacy in years to come, calling himself 'servant of the servants of Christ'. He sent missions to Lombardy, Sardinia and England (He sent St. Augustine of Canterbury). He is called 'Apostle of the English'. Patron of musicians

Upgrade of the Church Extension

The extension is a wonderful space with the possibility of being so much more. With refurbishment it will be an ideal space for holding liturgical services, sacramental preparation, faith formation etc., part of our 'Building Hope' program in the parish. It has recently been repainted (first

time in over 40 years) and had the lighting upgraded. Replacing the pews, currently in a state of disrepair, with 200 chairs (a long-held desire) and providing some suitable tables for the main body of the church will cost approx €45,000. We are also looking at recarpeting the extension and the altar. We expect work to proceed in the autumn.
