

#### Feasts in the Church's Calendar

Tues 1st Feb.—St. Brigid, Abbess, Secondary Patron of Ireland. Known as 'Mary of the Gael', St Brigid is renowned for her hospitality, almsgiving and care of the sick.

Wed. 2nd — The Presentation of the Lord - Candlemas This feast is a remembrance of the Lord and Mary, his Mother.

Thurs 3rd-St Blaise, bishop & martyr. Bishop of Sebaste, martyred in Armenia in 315. Tradition states that he was a physician before becoming a bishop. Since the 8<sup>th</sup> century he has been venerated as the patron of those who suffer from disease of the throat.

### FROM THE PASTORS DESK The Bible – handbook for Christians

Each Sunday we hear the words of Jesus, words that were written down by the early Christians, and which have been preserved for us over the centuries by the Church. Thus Christ's promise has come true: 'Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.'

The Gospel consists of a series of stories, all of which coalesce to form one great story—the story of Jesus. While we all like to listen to a story, we grow tired if we are told the same story over and over again. When that happens we switch off. The same thing can happen with the Gospel story. It may come across as old, stale and lifeless.

How can we combat that stale and weary sense of the familiar? We have to try to hear the story afresh, indeed, as for the very first time. The Gospel is the greatest story ever told. But we need to recapture the wonder of it. We need to release the energy contained in it, if we are to experience the power it has to charm, surprise, shock, challenge, and inspire.

We need to hear it in such a way that we are drawn into it, and hear our own stories as we listen to it. When that happens, our stories merge with that of the Gospel, and are illuminated by it.

Everything we need is contained in the Gospel. Here we have the words of Jesus himself. Those who make this book their teacher will never go astrav.

It's not enough just to turn to the Gospel in times of misfortune. It's not enough to turn it into an object of veneration (like the Book of Kells). We have to examine our lives against the words of this book. Those words should kindle a fire in our hearts, and others should feel the warmth.

The Gospel contains only those things that are the best and the deepest in life. At the deepest level the teaching of Jesus rings true. In listening to him, you feel you are listening to the voice of God.

There was a saint who, whenever he was faced with a difficult decision would ask himself: What would the Book say? The answer would come back from deep inside him: you must do what is right and best. Thus the Book had an enormous influence on him. It strengthened him in moments of weakness. It inspired him in moments of generosity. It shamed him in moments of cowardice. But through it all he had grasped the essential thing: that the Gospel had to be lived.

The Gospel is the handbook of every Christian. The opinions of human beings are rooted in appearances and change from day to day but the words of Jesus do not pass away. We would do well to build the house of our life on his words. Fr. Flor McCarthy SDB

### Feast of St. Brigid–Lá Fheile Bhríde

St. Brigid, Abbess, Secondary Patron of Ireland-known as 'the Mary of the Gael', St Brigid is renowned for her hospitality, almsgiving and care of the sick. She was born c. 454. When she was young her father wished to make a very suitable marriage for her but she insisted in consecrating her virginity to God. She received the veil and spiritual formation probably from St. Mel and stayed for a period under his direction in Ardagh. Others followed her example and this led her to found a double monastery in Kildare with the assistance of Bishop Conleth. She died in 524 and her cult is widespread not only throughput Ireland but in several European lands. The St. Brigid's Cross, in legend used by Brigid to explain the Christian faith, remains a popular sign of God's protection.

We can't meet to make our St Brigid's crosses as we normally do, so instead of that, rushes, blessed at the 10.00 Mass on the Feast of St Brigid on the 1<sup>st</sup> of February, will be available in the church for collection. instructions on how to make one. St. Brigid's Cross is thought to keep evil, fire and hunger from the home in which it is displayed.

The Presentation of the Lord - Candlemas—Wed 2nd If anybody would like candles blessed on the Feast day, please leave in the Sacristy beforehand or bring on the day and place on the table in the sanctuary.


Feast of St. Blaise—Thurs. 3rd Throats will be blessed at the 10 am Mass to mark the Feast of St. Blaise. The blessing of St. Blaise is a sign of our faith in God's protection and love for us and for the sick. Using two crossed and unlighted candles, blessed on the memorial of St. Blaise or on the feast of the Presentation of the Lord, the minister touches the throat of each person saying, 'Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from all ailments of the throat and from every other evil. In the name of the Father...


