Liturgy of the Eucharist-The Consecration

In the liturgy of the Church, it is principally his own Paschal mystery that Christ signifies and makes present. During his earthly life Jesus announced his Paschal mystery by his teaching and anticipated it by his actions. When his Hour comes, he lives out the unique event of history, which does not pass away: Jesus dies, is buried, rises from the dead, and is seated at the right hand of the Father 'once for all.' His Paschal mystery is a real event that occurred in our history, but it is unique: all other historical events happen once, and then they pass away, swallowed up in the past. The Paschal mystery of Christ, by contrast, cannot remain only in the past, because by his death he destroyed death, and all that Christ is - all that he did and suffered for all people - participates in the divine eternity, and so transcends all times while being made present in them all. The event of the Cross and Resurrection abides and year. During this Mass each person will be draws everything toward life.

Each Mass, is a real foretaste here and now of the final banquet foretold by the prophets (cf. Is 25:6-9) and described in the New Testament as 'the marriage-feast of the Lamb' (Rev 19:7-9). In the Third Eucharistic Prayer, after calling to mind Jesus' ascension into heaven, when the celebrant says the words 'and ready to greet him when he comes again' we are invited to recognise that our 'calling to mind' of the foundational events of our faith brings us into contact with our shared future in the coming of Christ. For this reason, in proclaiming the mystery of faith, we acclaim that 'Christ will come again'. At every Mass we remember our future and are drawn towards

Because of the dynamic Eucharistic sense of 'memorial' where past and future are in some way already present to us here and now, we are never as close to our departed brothers and sisters as we are at the Mass. Our communion with those who have gone before us marked with the sign of faith is renewed. 'Celebrating the Eucharistic sacrifice therefore, we are most closely united to the Church in heaven.'. In this context we understand St. Monica's words to her sons, St. Augustine and his brother, before her death: 'I simply ask you to remember me at the Lord's altar wherever you are. All Souls Day—November 2nd

The custom of remembering the faithful departed goes back to the early days of the church, when their names were posted in the church so they could be remembered. As early as the sixth century, monasteries held special days of remembrance for the dead from their community and by the ninth century they were commemorating all the faithful departed.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church, citing Pope St Gregory the Great, explains: "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven." "The Church gives the name Purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned. (Cf. 1 Cor 3:15; 1 Pet 1:7). The Church formulated her doctrine of faith on Purgatory especially at the Councils of Florence and Trent. The days of commemoration varied although,

over time, most began to use November 2. In the fifteenth century, the Dominicans began offering three Masses on the Feast of All Souls. Then, in 1748, Pope Benedict XIV approved this practice, which caused it to quickly spread throughout Spain, Portugal and into Latin America.
