FROM THE PASTORS DESK

Pentecost Sunday—*Today we celebrate the outpouring of the* Holy Spirit. The fruits and gifts of the Holy Spirit are given to the Church to enable us to fulfil our mission of building God's kingdom. The 7 gifts are:

Wonder and awe in the presence of the Lord (fear of the Lord) helps us to honour the Lord and make Him number one in our lives. Helps us to see signs of God's presence in our lives and in the world around us. Helps us to see God in the love and care of our parents and friends. Helps us to see God in new life and growth in the people around us in the world. **Reverence** (piety) helps us to be grateful to God for His blessings and to respect all of God's creation. Helps us to love God as Jesus did. Helps us to be aware of God's love for us as enable us to bring this love to others. **Courage** (fortitude) helps us to boldly live by and proclaim the Gospel. Helps us to continue to do what is right even if others oppose us. Helps us to speak the truth even if it means we suffer in consequence. Gives us courage especially when life is most difficult, when we are alone or afraid. Right judgment (counsel) helps us to make decisions guided by the Holy Spirit. Helps us not to be too quick in judging others. Helps us not to be prejudiced. Helps us to be quick to admit when we are wrong Knowledge helps us to put trust in the Lord and to have confidence in His teaching. Helps us to know the reasons why things are as they are. Helps us to know God better. Helps us to know always what it is that God wants us to do.

Understanding helps us to see the Lord and His ways more deeply. Helps us to understand how people are feeling deep inside. Helps us never to do anything to hurt others. Helps us especially to understand those whose needs are greater than our own, the very young and the very old, those who are sick and those who are poor

That is what we are called to do: to experience the risen Christ and to share the experience with others; to roll away the stone from the tomb where we may have enclosed the Lord, in order to spread his joy in the world. Let us make Jesus, the Living One, rise again from all those tombs in which we have sealed him. Let us set him free from the narrow cells in which we have so often imprisoned him. Let us awaken from our peaceful slumber and let him disturb and inconvenience us. Let us bring him into our everyday lives: through gestures of peace in these days marked by the horrors of war, through acts of reconciliation amid broken relationships, acts of compassion towards those in need, acts of justice amid situations of inequality and of truth in the midst of lies. And above all, through works of love and fraternity.


Brothers and sisters our hope has a name: the name of Jesus. He entered the tomb of our sin; he descended to those depths where we feel most lost; he wove his way through the tangles of our fears, bore the weight of our burdens and from the dark abyss of death restored us to life and turned our mourning into joy. Let us celebrate Easter with Christ! He is alive! Today, too, he walks in our midst, changes us and sets us free. Thanks to him, evil has been robbed of its power; failure can no longer hold us back from starting anew: and death has become a passage to the stirrings of new life. For with Jesus, the Risen Lord, no night will last forever; and even in the darkest night, in that darkness, the morning star continues to shine Christ is risen!


The St. Vincent de Paul monthly outdoor collection takes place next weekend—11th/12th June Your generosity will be much appreciated
